From the desk of Father Terry Kerner

In the next few days, you will be receiving our parish letter seeking your support for the Catholic Services Appeal (CSA). Many folks have already gotten a letter from the Archbishop offering an opportunity to donate directly to the Archdiocese. Some parishioners have commented that they have found it a little confusing or even cumbersome. We are asking that you use the parish form and return it to St. Kateri via the offertory, mail, or directly to the parish office. Our Finance Council has suggested we ask each parishioner for a \$300 gift which comes out to about 82 cents a day. As in past years we will apply any funds received over our CSA target to capital improvements around the parish. Currently we plan to pour a new sidewalk in front of the parish office and also replace eave troughs and downspouts on the church and rectory. You have always been very generous to the CSA and allowed us at St. Kateri to maintain a beautiful campus and parish buildings. I have no doubt that this year will not be an exception. Thank You for your generosity!

The American Red Cross has asked us to host a Blood Drive because of the severe shortage they are experiencing. Due to the lost opportunities because of Covid. You can find more info and how to register for donating in today's bulle-

tin. This would guarantee a specific appointment time for you. Or you can just walk in. We have agreed to hosting TWO drives: Sundays May 30th and June 6th from 8 am to 2pm in the parish hall. Our dates chosen, Memorial Day weekend and D-Day, are intended to honor our fellow Americans who have shed their blood for us!



FUN FACTS!

Christianity began with a small group of disciples that followed Jesus in his earthly life. Today, there are over 2.3 billion Christians in the world (about 1/3 of the world's population). We still have a lot of work to do to proclaim the Gospel to every creature!

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G od remains where love remains. When a believer realizes without doubt that God is love, it is a powerful moment. Being able to place our resurrection trust in this fundamental truth allows us to experience God's presence in all of our experiences: the good and the bad, positive and negative, life enriching and destructive events we encounter. It is no wonder that St. Paul so accurately tells us that it is love that endures all things and lasts. How can God not endure or ever fade away? Because he is God, Jesus also guarded and protected his disciples as the endearing shepherd who always had their best interest at heart.

I f we become too immersed in the world, we lose touch with these deeper realities. We can become so preoccupied with preserving what we have created or think that we need, forgetting that it is not building our city that really matters, but God's. Jesus clearly did not belong to the world and, by virtue of his resurrection, he tries to get us to understand that we do not either. The truth brings us to other worldly, more divine places and takes our eyes off of the concerns that often captivate our fears and storm our senses.

Life can easily erode our faith. Think of your life over the last couple of weeks. What challenged your faith and distracted your divine glance? Even being overly stimulated with technology and social media can erode our sense of confidence and cause us

to forget who we really are. We need to distance ourselves from the world in order to experience the joy that Christ offers. The world will never like the word of God. It is too challenging and too perplexing. The world mistakenly believes that it can survive on its own. It is a mistaken judgment that may cost people a lot in the end. It is all so very simple: God remains when we love one anoth-



er. If in all the business of our lives and all that each day brings, the good and the bad, we follow the call and path of love, we will walk with God. There is nothing to fear and anxiety finds no home.

ASCENSION OF THE LORD

Question:

Couldn't Jesus have done more good if he stayed on earth, rather than ascended into heaven?

This is an interesting question! During his earthly life, Jesus gave sight to the blind, healed paralytics, drove out demons, and fed thousands with only a few loaves of bread. Imagine what he could have done if he'd never ascended into heaven! Imagine what our world could be! It's an interesting thought to consider, especially as the world faces challenges that only seem to deepen and expand. Yet at the Last Supper, Jesus says, "It is better for you if I go." Why? His response must have seemed strange to the Apostles at the time. In his place, Jesus says, he will send the Paraclete, the Comforter, the Advocate. He promises to send the Holy Spirit.

Jesus' departure allows the Apostles to become the leaders he has formed them to be. Jesus is no longer situated in only one geographical location, and his Church will never be a political kingdom. Soon after the Ascension, we celebrate Pentecost — the descent of the Holy Spirit and the radical empowerment of the followers of Jesus. We share in that empowerment and in that mission. Jesus is present in the sacraments, and he is present in us. Through our faith, hope, &love, we are called to be the good he does here on earth!

Gospel:


We hear Jesus' prayer to his Father for the protection of the disciples, especially against "the evil one" in the world. **Where do you personally experience evil in the world today?**

	THE POWER OF THE PRAYING THE ROSARY
nce	HAS WROUGHT COUNTLESS MIRACLES

1571 St. Pope Pius V called for Europe to pray the rosary as the Battle of Lepanto approached. Christendom's forces were outmatched, but the Battle had a miraculous turn of events & the Ottoman Turks were defeated, thereby preserving Christian Europe.

1938 - Patrick Peyton was diagnosed with advanced Tuberculosis, a malady incurable at the time. He was encouraged to pray, & he did so, devoting himself to the rosary. Soon the Tuberculosis disappeared with no medical explanation. Patrick went on to become the famous Father Patrick Peyton, who lead the rosary crusade of the 20th century & who was famous for saying, "'The family that prays together stays together. "

1945 - The atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima. Eight blocks from ground zero was a Catholic church. It was destroyed in the blast, but next to it was a house inhabited by eight Jesuit missionaries- it was still standing (not a window was broken), & the Jesuits survived. They had a daily practice of praying the rosary & living the message or Fatima. Doctors were incredulous. Over their collective lifetimes they were examined by over 200 physicians. It was believed the residual effects of the bomb would take hold and they would die premature deaths, but this never happened.

These three examples are only the tip of the ice burg when it comes to the power of praying the rosary!
