From the desk of Father Terry Kerner

June inaugurates Summer and the invitation to enjoy the outdoors and even a change of pace with family and friends. It is also a time to celebrate weddings, graduations, anniversaries, First Communions and a host of other memorable events. It is particularly special for me in that I will be celebrating my 50th anniversary of ordination with my fellow classmates next Wednesday at Sacred Heart Seminary. Recalling those very early days in the seminary I remember beginning college with 93 classmates. Today we are now at three priests — one of whom happens to be a bishop in Minnesota. Priests are becoming fewer and fewer. Current estimates for the Archdiocese is that in ten years, because of deaths and retirement, we will be half the number we currently are. The facts have prompted our Archbishop to restructure the Archdiocese and create a new understanding of how the Church ministers. Beginning July first we will be functioning as a "family of parishes" collaborating with the priests and parishioners of Saints Alphonsus — St. Clement, St. Barbara, and St. Maria Goretti. I have agreed to being the Moderator of the family. Don't let the change disturb or worry you. There will be some changes but none that with prayer and goodwill that we cannot handle. I do ask that everyone with sincere prayer and effort support the new model we will be experiencing over time.

Another response to the priest shortage is to pray for vocations. This weekend Archbishop Vigneron is leading us — priests, deacons, religious and laity — in prayer for a culture that fosters and celebrates vocations to the priesthood. The intent of the year of prayer that ends with Pentecost, 2023 is to encourage people to hear the call of the Holy Spirit and the call to serve. I invite all of us to give generously of our heartfelt prayer for vocations.

Thank you to all who have taken the opportunity to support our annual CSA drive. As of this writing on May 31st we have reached 80% of our target. But why am I surprised, this is generous St. Kateri!

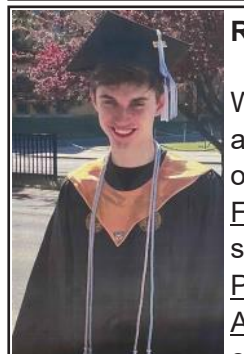

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

Even though Pentecost is rightly celebrated in late spring, the robust experience of a New England fall can provide a profound metaphor for reflection. A full expression of fall colors is beautiful to behold. But, with all of its majesty and beauty, the observer knows the experience of death is soon to come. Creation will be dark and barren for a while. Pentecost cannot be separated from the cross. Before God's transformative, life-giving power can bear fruit, we must first die.

Pentecost is all about leaving the lifeless dead wood behind and allowing God, through the power of the Holy Spirit, to create something new. These Pentecost creations happen repeatedly over and over again. The birthing process of the Church is ongoing. God is always bringing life out of death and creating something where there was once nothing. That is why the fall is such an apropos metaphorical season for Pentecost. In order to really receive the gift of the Holy Spirit we have to die to what we once knew and what no longer works.

When fire and wind find their fullest expression, they are in no way gentle nor kind. They have the potential to level anything in their paths. We are experiencing great turmoil in our world, nation, and our Church. Whether the result of circumstance or the work of the Holy Spirit, much of what we knew to be normal and constant is changing. Common systems and institutional structures that may have worked for a time no longer do. When the



old and familiar need to be left behind, God creates something new. Change and disorder do not need to be our enemies. They always bring opportunities for something exciting and new. What we need is untiring faith, firm hope, and perfect love.

What we need is for the Holy Spirit to enlighten us to see what is important and what we must do. *"O Holy Spirit, descend plentifully into my heart. Enlighten the dark corners of this neglected dwelling and scatter there Thy cheerful beams."* (St. Augustine) If we experience joy, even in the midst of turbulence, then we will know we are exactly where God needs us to be. If not, then perhaps there is a lesson in the decaying leaves that graciously descend to the ground on a crisp fall day.

7 Things Every High School Graduate Should Hear

1. Live with intention. College will be full of new opportunities. Think carefully about your priorities for your new start.
2. Make the right friends. There will be plenty of new people! Concentrate on the ones who motivate you to be a better person.

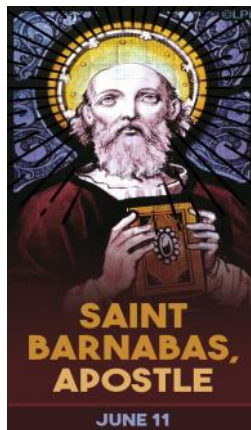

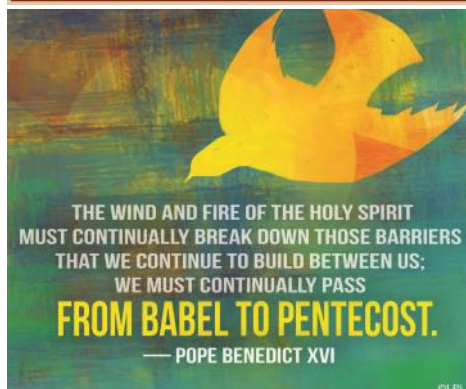
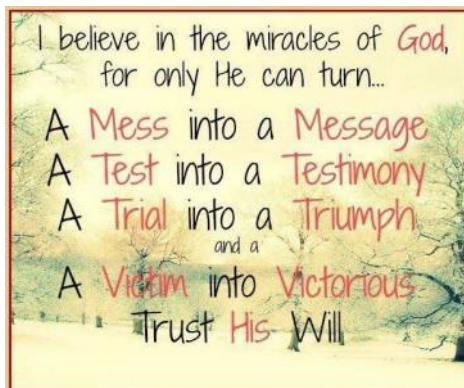
