MEET OUR NEW AUXILIARY BISHOP

Archbishop Paul Fitzpatrick Russell was born May 2, 1959, in Greenfield, Mass., the son of the late Isabelle Fitzpatrick Russell and the late Thaddeus Russell.

After his parents divorced when he was in third grade, he moved with his mother and sister to Alpena, growing up in northern Michigan's Diocese of Gaylord. He attended the parish grade school of St. Bernard of Clairvaux in Alpena, where his great-great grandfather was one of the founding members in the late 1800s.



After graduating from Alpena High School in 1977, Archbishop Russell spent a year as an exchange student in France, where he began to discern a calling to the priesthood. He entered St. John's Seminary in the Archdiocese of Boston, where his father's family lived, and was ordained a priest on June 20, 1987, at the Cathedral of the Holy Cross in Boston.

As a priest, Archbishop Russell's first assignment was as associate pastor of Sacred Heart Parish in Lynn, Mass., where he served for five years. In 1992, he was briefly named associate pastor of St. Eulalia Parish in Winchester, Mass.; however, three days into his assignment, he was asked to become priest-secretary to Boston's cardinal-archbishop, Cardinal Bernard Law.

In 1993, while serving as Cardinal Law's secretary, Fr. Russell was asked to enter the diplomatic service of the Holy See, and was sent to study at the Pontifical Ecclesiastical Academy in Rome, which trains Vatican diplomats.

After graduating from the academy, as well as earning his doctorate in canon law from the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome, he began working in the diplomatic service in 1997 under Msgr. James Harvey, who was then assessor to the Vatican's Secretariat of State. Six months later, he received his first assignment outside of Rome in the apostolic nunciature to Ethiopia, Eritrea and Djibouti in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, serving there until 2000.

On Jan. 21, 2000, he was named a "Chaplain of His Holiness" (monsignor) by Pope St. John Paul II.

In 2000, the pope transferred Msgr. Russell to the apostolic nunciature in Ankara, Turkey, and in 2002, he moved again to the apostolic nunciature in Bern, Switzerland. In 2005, Pope Benedict XVI asked Msgr. Russell to serve in the apostolic nunciature in Abuja, Nigeria, where he remained for another three years.

On July 6, 2007, Pope Benedict elevated Msgr. Russell's rank, this time to "Prelate of Honor," the second of three ranks of monsignor.

The next year, Pope Benedict asked Msgr. Russell to take on the unique assignment of Chargé d'Affaires (head of mission) of the Vatican's presence in Taipei, Taiwan, an important task, given the Church's complicated relationship with China and the self-governing island. He served in that capacity for eight years, from 2008-16.

On March 19, 2016, Pope Francis announced he was naming Msgr. Russell as apostolic nuncio — the Vatican's top ambassador — to Turkey and Turkmenistan, an assignment that carried with it his elevation to the episcopate. At the same time, the pope named him titular bishop of Novi, Montenegro.

Archbishop Russell was ordained and consecrated a bishop on June 3, 2016, by Cardinal Sean P. O'Malley at the Cathedral of the Holy Cross in Boston. Among his two co-consecrators were Archbishop Allen H. Vigneron of Detroit & Archbishop Leo Cushley of St. Andrews & Edinburgh, Scotland.

In 2018, Pope Francis added Azerbaijan to Archbishop Russell's responsibilities as nuncio.

On May 23, 2022, Pope Francis appointed Archbishop Russell as the 31st auxiliary bishop of the Archdiocese of Detroit, serving under the jurisdiction of Archbishop Vigneron. He was installed to the archdiocese during a Liturgy of Welcome and Inauguration of Ministry on July 7, 2022.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

“Our families need to ask for the gift of the Spirit! Through prayer, even in the busiest times, we give time back to God, we find the peace that comes from appreciating the important things, and we encounter the joy of God’s unexpected gifts. Through daily prayer may our homes become, like the house of Martha and Mary, places where Jesus always finds a warm welcome (Pope Francis).” While it is necessary to attend to the details of hospitality, learning how to be present to people, experiences, and God is sometimes more important. Creating homes that are welcoming environments requires not only organization and structure but members who truly enjoy being there and celebrating life with one another.



tality can distract us from being present to those we want to serve. Conversely, focusing exclusively on being present without any attention to detail also sets our attempts at hospitality up for disaster! We need a balance of both. But creating a truly welcoming space in our homes and within ourselves requires still more.

Details can often get the best of us. While attending to details is important to success, our obsession with them can be problematic. Whether wanting to make a good impression, fear of failure, insecurity, or emotional immaturity, throwing ourselves into the “details” of hospi-

We have to be empty of ourselves. Becoming a welcoming, hospitable person is not possible in someone focused on their own needs and desires. If the one we serve is the one who looks back at us in the mirror, then there is no space for anyone else. While Martha and Mary had different ideas of what it means to serve, they both had the inner space and freedom

to do so. They were detached from themselves. Detachment becomes the challenge to hospitality and creating a God-centered, open-hearted space in our lives. When we impulsively act out of our personal agendas, violence, abuse, pride, greed, lust, power, control, passion, and self-aggrandizement encroach upon the space needed to be present to another human being. Not only can others not find a home in us, but even God cannot find a home in us!

REFLECT AND RESPOND TO SCRIPTURE

First Reading:

Abraham’s treatment of the three strangers modeled the value of hospitality. **How do you show hospitality to others?**

Second Reading:

Paul speaks of the Church (the community of believers) as “the body” of Christ. And as members of the Church, it is Christ “whom we proclaim” so that all believers may be “perfect in Christ.” **Why do you think proclaiming Christ can make us “perfect”?**

Gospel:

Jesus teaches Martha that stress and anxiety has caused her to lose perspective on important matters. **How does your faith ground you in the daily anxieties of your life?**

Be Ready for God to “Stop By”

In my experience, most people can be divided into two groups: those who are old enough to remember when you kept food on hand for company, and those who aren’t.

For those of you in the latter group, let me explain. Before text messaging and social media made us all unconditionally, mercilessly reachable, people would do this thing called “stopping by.” They would be passing by a friend’s house, maybe on the way home from work or shopping, and they would just ... stop. With no warning. No notice whatsoever. “I was just in the neighborhood,” they would say. I remember my mother and I would do this on many a Saturday. It wasn’t an everyday occurrence, but it was common enough that you had to be ready.

“Crazy,” you might exclaim. “People just appeared on your doorstep? How did you cope with the uncertainty?” Well, most of us had moms who kept a little something on hand to eat or drink that was extra nice, just in case anyone stopped by. That way, we were always ready.

Today’s readings are about a lot of things: prayer, hope, redemptive suffering. They’re about what it means to *be* a Christian, and not just what it means to do Christian things.

Most of all, though, they’re about readiness. If God showed up at your door, would you be ready for Him? Would you be ready for what He gives you, or what He takes away? Would you be ready for Him to interrupt the plans you have for yourself? To disrupt the idea you carry in your mind of what a servant or a steward is supposed to be?

Read your Bible. Say your rosary. Go to Mass. Get to Confession. Talk to God - every day, not just when you think you need Him. That way, you are always ready.

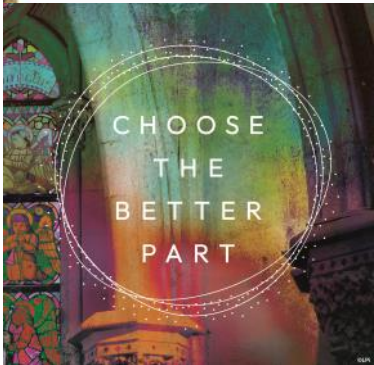

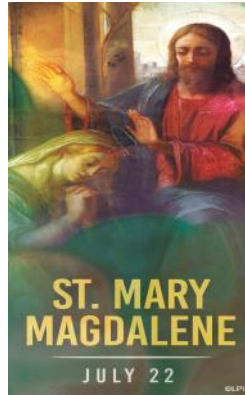
