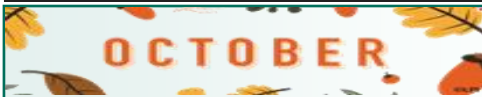
From the Pastor's Desk by Fr. Terry Kerner,

With the November election coming soon the foremost issue for Michigan is the Proposal 3. Certainly, for Catholics and fellow Christians in our State the Proposal presents a moral challenge — one that we have every right to preach against. It is not a case of the Church speaking politics but one of seriously confronting a threat to life in our society and state. Looking back over the last half century we realize that over sixty million lives have been aborted meaning that they are not wanted nor acceptable.

Obviously, the abortion issue is extremely sensitive and complicated for both men and women, fathers and mothers, and husbands and wives. We cannot overlook the anguish that women might be suffering when seeking a solution to an unwanted or unexpected pregnancy. We must not judge but rather respect the life of both child and mother. We need to find ways of walking with mothers on their journeys to motherhood. We all try to do the best we can as you may recall St. Kateri's fund raiser last year for the Lennon Center. With the exuberant encouragement of our parish children, we raised over twelve thousand dollars. Obviously, our hearts are in the right place. We also need to pray for all who are struggling with the issue of abortion and pray for and with them.

Nor can we fail to sympathize with couples desperate to have children and are unable to do so. Through the years I have worked with and for many couple in their attempt to adopt a child. Their desire to do so is not easily achieved nor without expense. One has to admire their commitment to bringing a vulnerable child into their home.

In all the turmoil abortion can bring to our consciences we can take confidence that God is speaking to us about the incredible value of life and family and our ability to protect both. One month from now we have the opportunity to be specific and courageous in doing so!

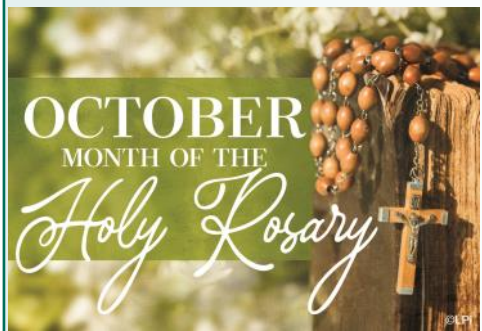

Vote NO on Proposal 3
DEFEAT THE ANYTHING GOES
ABORTION AMENDMENT

This November election, the Catholic bishops in Michigan are urging all Michiganders to vote **NO on Proposal 3**. The measure would add an amendment to the state constitution to:

- * Legalize abortion at anytime in pregnancy for any reason.
- * Allow abortions to be performed by anyone, even those without a medical license.
- * Allow any person to help teens obtain abortions without their parents knowing.
- * Protect abortion providers from penalties for killing or injuring a woman during an abortion.
- * Revoke state law that requires abortion facilities to be licensed and inspected.
- * Require taxpayers to pay for abortions.

This amendment allows abortion for:

ANY ONE: any age... including minors

ANY TIME: up to the moment of birth... and beyond birth

ANYWHERE: in a medical facility...or any other location

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

Then lepers were cured. Only one returned to give thanks. When we fall victim to entitlement, we diminish our capacity to love. Never satisfied, we walk around with outstretched arms, eagerly searching for the next thing we want so that we can acquire it ourselves. Very rarely do entitled hands hold anything to freely give away to others. Entitled hands also find it challenging to reach toward heaven in a gesture of gratitude and praise. We are often more obsessed with celebrating our victories, securing our assets, safeguarding our futures, and stacking the deck of life in our favor rather than relishing and absorbing the gift of the moment and blessings received.

Entitled people find it difficult to pray properly. When the subject of our prayer is mostly about our needs and wants, we are falling into the trap of deception. We foolishly try to convince God that our tiny worlds are of greater importance than His. In ancient times, people would offer sacrifices to "the gods" to secure protection and favors. Our God desires mercy, not sacrifice, because

He is about love and justice, not simply meeting our agendas. Every breath is a gift. Prayer, which is a celebration of that gift, acknowledges the Giver. Prayer strengthens the bond between Giver and receiver, creating a deepening awareness that nothing I am or anything I have can exist apart from His Divine Will. It also reminds us that we have done nothing to merit the unconditional love and mercy God showers upon us. Prayer is not just about getting what I need but celebrating who I am.



For St. Therese of Lisieux prayer is "a surge of the heart; it is a simple look turned toward heaven, it is a cry of recognition and of love, embracing both trial and joy."

When our hearts "surge" toward God, we rush to the Source of our restoration and wholeness, knowing our longing for God's Divine embrace. Prayer is a response to God's graciousness with an act of gratitude returned by us. In prayer, we gaze upon each other in that sacred space where I give myself to God as He is, and God gives Himself to me as I am. We cannot take another step without saying thank you.

This can only happen when abundance and kind gestures are seen as gifts and not something to which we are entitled. The power of gratitude is more profound when we realize all that we are and all we are given do not have a human source but are of God. Walking around believing that our glass is only half full leaves us always wanting more. We are never satisfied. We become nothing more than entitled pursuers of whatever we can get. Instead, the one who is eager to count their blessings and appreciate the wonder and beauty of the gift of life itself is at peace. Before they take another step or venture off on another journey, they bow in gratitude to the presence of God himself. They are most keenly aware that all would cease to be without God.

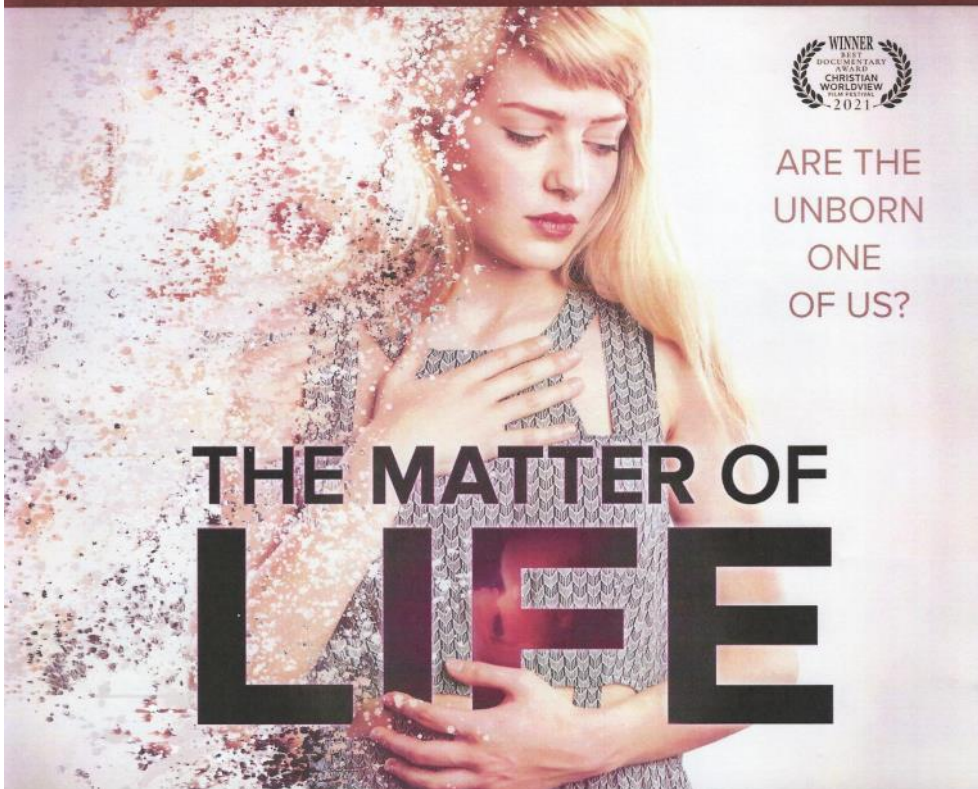

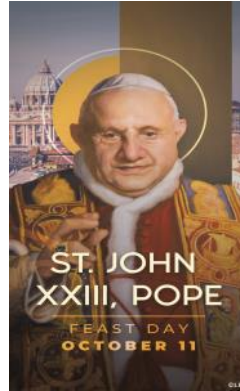

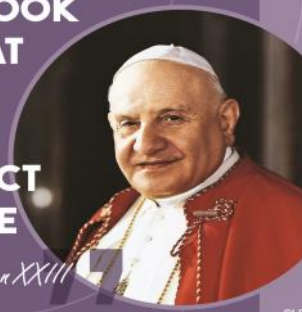
