AN EASTER PROCLAMATION



Registration is the official way we join a parish community. Many people think that because they attend a particular parish they automatically belong. At times, young adults who have moved away for years think they are still signed up under their parents. But membership requires signing up, formally enrolling yourself in a parish. Registration is a commitment to a community, a way to be included in the religious, social, and ministerial activities of your parish. Your registration affects the parish in many ways. Census numbers can determine how many priests are assigned to a church, what benefits and obligations the community has to the diocese, and how Masses, Confessions, and devotions are planned and scheduled. Registration shows you belong. It is also necessary for certain benefits, like scheduling sacraments, obtaining sponsor certificates, and getting donation statements for taxes. Most importantly, it lets the parish count on you, to call on you to assist in its mission. Registering in your parish is a statement of faith and confidence in the life and work of your parish.

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ALWAYS CHOOSE KINDNESS

Acts of kindness are always rewarded. A year ago, last February (2022), I was going to visit friends in Florida. I arrived early and was waiting in the TSA line at DTW Airport. There were two agents, each who had a passenger being screened. One, was a man traveling alone. The other, a very young mother with a one-year-old child. My first instinct was to get behind the man because surely, he would be quicker to get through. I chose the young mother's line. Little did I know, that choice was a gift God was sending me.

As I was walking towards the conveyer belt, I noticed the mother struggling to dismantle the stroller, while holding her child and wearing a backpack. I asked her, "what can I do to help you?" Without hesitation she handed me Louie, her one-year-old son. She placed her items in tubs for inspection. After clearing security, I asked her where they were flying to. As luck would have it, they were flying to Sarasota, as well, on the same flight as me. We had two hours before our departure and decided to grab something to eat. While eating lunch, she told me her mother said a prayer that she would meet someone who would help her in the TSA line.

While getting to know each other, she told me she had been a surgical nurse at UCLA Medical Center in Los Angeles. That gave me the opportunity to give her one of my 'God bless nurses coins', which I purchased in our "**world famous**" St. Kateri Gift Shop. She then told me her first-born daughter, Quinn, (at seven months old) had a brain seizure and is unable to walk and speak. Chelsea and her husband needed the love and support of family in this medical crisis, so they moved back to Michigan.

Several years later their son, Louis, was born. She told me her son loved airplanes. I told her I had just retired from dispatching aircraft at Willow Run Airport. I asked her for her address and said I would send some items regarding the Blue Angels and Air Force Thunderbirds. I placed a letter to Louie in the box. I wrote, that if one day, he chose to be a pilot, he could fly where the angels live and see the beauty of our great country.

Since last year-ago February, I have met Chelsea and Louie for lunch several times and recently had her family over for breakfast.

Sometimes things like this only happen in movies. How lucky I was to choose kindness that day! This meeting has enriched me with a friend and her family for life! -Shirley Janulis

GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

"When Jesus had risen, early on the first day of the week, he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, out of whom he had driven seven demons." (Mark 16:9)



Popular Catholic piety sometimes posits that the newly risen Jesus appears first to the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is a happy thought, but it's simply not what the scriptures report. We are told quite directly that he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, "**out of whom he had driven seven demons.**"

Why would the gospel writer remind us of this unsavory detail of Mary's past? Historians tell us women

were not qualified to give legal testimony. On top of that, to be possessed by not just one, but seven demons, is unsavory and terrifying. What damage had they done to her? What did she do to allow herself to be home to such evil? It doesn't seem to matter. Jesus chose Mary Magdalene to be the first one who saw him risen from the dead. He decided she was qualified.

Do you think that you are disqualified from seeing and announcing the risen Jesus because of your past demons? Maybe they are the demons of despair, confusion, self-hatred, pride, addiction, failure, boredom, laziness, or other sins. Well, don't. In the light of the Risen Jesus, all these past demons make our witness that much more believable — only if we allow ourselves to be touched by the liberating hand of Christ, just as Mary Magdalene did.

LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

We are witnesses of all that Christ has done — in our lives, in our souls, in our hearts. We have seen the empty tomb. We have touched the abandoned burial cloths. "Go tell my brothers," Jesus commands us. "Do not be afraid."

REFLECT AND RESPOND TO SCRIPTURE

First Reading:

Peter speaks about himself and the other apostles as "witnesses" to Jesus' public ministry as well as his death and resurrection from the dead. What are some ways you could give witness to the risen Jesus this week?

Second Reading:

Paul encourages the Christians in Corinth to see themselves as a community defined by sincerity and truth rather than malice and wickedness. **Does this describe your circle of friends?**

Gospel:

The two women (Mary Magdalene and the other Mary) experience a range of emotions (from fear to being overjoyed) as they encounter first the angel and then the resurrected Jesus. **How do you imagine you would react to encountering Jesus risen from the dead?**



When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place. Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first,

and he saw and believed. _ Jn 20:6-B


