From the Pastor's Desk by Fr. Terry Kerner,

Speaking for the parish I want to thank all who have contributed to the Catholic Services Appeal (CSA) thus far. Your support has been generous with so many of you sharing what you can to make it successful. We are not done yet. Throughout the summer donations can always be made via the mail or in the offertory box. Currently, after four weeks, we find ourselves at 106% of our target. At this point any contributions made now remain in the parish. The "over the top" funds will be used to replace the aging air conditioning unit for the church. I think we all have an interest in achieving that goal! Once again many thanks for all the support.

This past Thursday, June 6th Americans had the privilege to remember the 80th Anniversary of D-Day. This pivotal event in WW II literally changes the course of the war and our own history. Most who had a direct participation on that day, indeed during the world war, are leaving us. We pray that their legacy be not forgotten nor ignored. 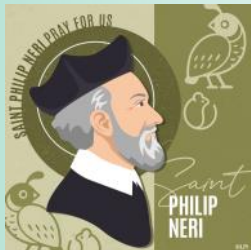

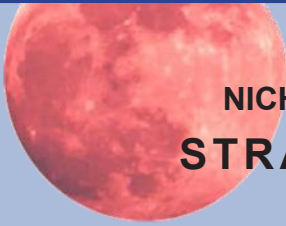

If you could find it in your heart to help us feed our neighbors in need, this would be wonderful. When we give food to a new client, often they leave here with tears in their eyes. This truly warms our hearts here at the pantry. We all know we are doing God's work and are very proud of our work. So, without your help we are nothing. A special prayer for all our donators is said every time we gather, and a special prayer will be said for all who travel this time of the year. 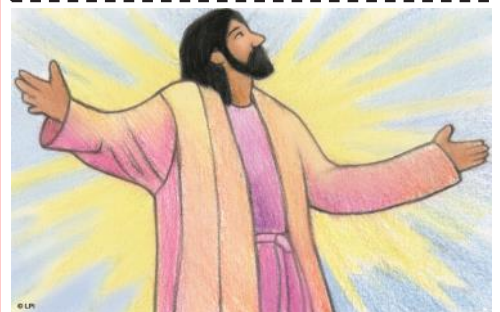

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

Jesus asks us a stunning question this week: **“How can Satan cast out Satan?”** To enter into this question opens up the often-hidden dynamics of what Jesus has done and is constantly doing. If we’re honest, our response to some degree is: *“How else can we cast him out? Satan is precisely how we cast out Satan!”* But Jesus wants us to see this finally does not work. Here’s what I mean.



Satanas names the demonic mechanism by which we render wholeness through accusation. When we face a threat, we seek something to protect us (e.g., more money, social status, security, power, etc.). Rivals inevitably arise for these things and so do tensions. Accusation presents itself. *“I’ll never be successful unless I get ahead of that guy.”* *“She’s already trying to get ahead of me.”* *“That group of immigrants is trying to take our jobs.”* And so on. The accusation grows into a fear-inducing threat — things will break apart — no, they al-

ready are! Hurry! We inflict violence on the victim and - as if by magic - peace ensues. For a time. Soon fresh accusations are required to hold new chaos at bay, until there is no community left at all. This is essentially humankind’s sad history in a nutshell.

Jesus’ cross and resurrection unmasks this broken system of “casting out Satan by Satan” and ushers in a new one he calls “the Kingdom of God.” He reveals that the dynamic of accusation is nothing compared to his power of divine mercy and love. The cross (and not Satan) is the real power to tear down strongholds of sin and cast out Satan. This is why he describes himself as the **“stronger man who ties up the strong man to plunder his house.”** This week let’s notice the ways we **“cast out Satan by Satan,”** and then refuse to do it anymore. Because in the long run, that divided house cannot stand.
