From the Pastor's Desk by Fr. Terry Kerner,

Have a great week ahead and remember those Lions.





October - month of the rosary The Scriptural Rosary **Origin of the Mysteries**

During the thirteenth century, a prayer form, which would soon give the Rosary its Mysteries, began to develop. Many medieval theologians had long considered the 150 Psalms to be veiled prophecies about the life. death & resurrection of Jesus. By deep meditation and skillful interpretation of the Psalms certain of these men began to compose 'Psalters of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.' These were series of 150 praises in honor of Jesus, based upon interpretations of the 150 Psalms. Soon 'psalters' devoted to 150 praises of Mary were also composed. When a psalter of Marian praises numbered 50 instead of 150 it was commonly called a 'rosarium,' or a bouquet. Thus, during the thirteenth century there were four distinct 'psalters' in use at the same time: the 150 Our Fathers, the 150 Angelic Salutations, the 150 praises of Jesus, and the 150 praises of Mary. In an age when unity was held in such high regard, perhaps it was inevitable that these four prayer forms should eventually be combined.
