## *FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK by Fr. Terry Kerner*

I want to take this opportunity to thank all friends and parishioners who offered Christmas greetings, gifts and goodies. All added up to making my last Christmas at St. Kateri most memorable. As I announced over the holidays, I will be retiring at the end of June this coming summer. Retirement does not mean retiring from priesthood but from active ministry as your pastor for twenty years. The Archdiocesan policy is for priests to step down at age 80 from parish administration. I reached that "golden mark" last October. At my request Archbishop Vigneron graciously granted me this extra current year. The bishop called me a few weeks ago to remind me that I needed to make the retirement announcement by the beginning of the new year. Bishop Monforton also emphasized that he wanted our parish to know that St. Kateri would NOT be closing in the years ahead. Good news for all of us.

I will be living at the Senior Priest Village in Livonia alongside nineteen other senior priests all of whom help in various parishes with masses, confessions and various needs. I will share more with you as I approach retirement. For now, I can only say that twenty years seems like a long time but feels to have gone so quickly at this time of my life. You have all made it meaningful and something I cherish very much. I hope to visit often.

One very remarkable quality of St. Kateri parish is generosity and care for the needy. Christmas time every year reveals this in beautiful ways. I want to share with you the help you have given to others over the past few weeks.

A consistent charity we support every year is Nativity Parish located in the poorest part of Detroit. This year from the Giving Tree you donated over 200 gifts.

The Giving Tree this year included a new need for a new charity:

St. Joseph Helpers, a group of men who volunteer their time and talent helping seniors make repairs to their property. The men do not charge for their labor but only ask for some help with material. You responded by donating gift cards for Ace, Home Depot and Lowes.

The Giving Tree again included this year the St. Vincent de Paul Society. A very generous \$3,600 was given for this traditional charity and divided between the St. Alphonsus – St. Clement and St. Maria Goretti Conferences.

Christmas 2025, with gratitude for St. Kateri's blessings through the years, dedicated 10% of its Christmas collection to feeding the hungry. This significant collection yielded \$7,548 for the St. Maria Goretti Food Pantry. Combined with the \$1,800 from the Giving Tree, we can be grateful for being able to offer nearly \$10,000 to help the vulnerable.

### NEW YEAR HOUSE BLESSING TRADITION

The Epiphany house blessing traditions that were brought here by our Eastern European ancestors have been mostly forgotten. However, house blessings are still very relevant in our current times. Pope Francis speaks much about "domestic churches"...our homes where we live out our faith in concrete ways each day (not just set aside for church on Sunday). The house blessing can be a way to practice this concept.

The blessing is usually performed by family members who recite a prayer, sprinkle holy water, light incense and chalk the home's entrance doorposts with the inscription "20+C+M+B+26." What looks like a math equation are actually symbols that remind us of our dedication to God in everyday life. The symbols also remind us to be welcoming to all those who enter our homes throughout the year. The numbers 20 and 26 refer to the year of the blessing. The letters are abbreviations of the Latin words, "Christus mansionen benedicat" which means, "May Christ bless this house". The same letters also refer to the Three Kings: Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar. The + signs represent the cross.

We invite you and your families to participate in this meaningful tradition. It provides another opportunity for families to pray together as a domestic church...just as the early Christians did. We have updated the house blessing kits that are available in the Gift Shop. The kit includes chalk, an incense stick, a small bottle of holy water, and a house blessing prayer. Suggested donation to cover the cost of supplies is \$2.00.

This love transforms our lives and fills us with joy.”



## GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

Apple ran a commercial not long ago called “Behind the Mac – Greatness.” It shows artists and creators, such as Kendrick Lamar, Billie Eilish, and Lady Gaga, working behind their MacBooks. The narration says,

“There’s a certain kind of person who doesn’t wait for greatness. They make it.” It’s a compelling message. There’s beauty in using our gifts with passion and purpose. But there lies a hidden weight in that idea: If you are what you make, what happens when you can’t anymore? When the project fails, the passion fades, or the spotlight moves on, where is greatness then?

Today’s Gospel offers a differing vision of greatness. Jesus steps into the Jordan River. He hasn’t preached, healed, or performed a single miracle. Then the heavens open, and the Father speaks: “You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased.” It’s not a reward for success. It’s not earned. Before he does anything “great,” Jesus receives the greatness of his identity from the Father.

And so do you. At your baptism, God said the same thing over you: “You are my beloved.” That is your true identity, not constructed or earned but received. When we see ourselves and others this way, everything changes for the better. We discover a greatness that can never be taken away.

This week, reflect on your baptism: look up the date, thank God for it, pray for those baptized with you, or visit the church where it happened. Let your identity be rooted there.




