FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK by Fr. Terry Kerner

As many of you heard last weekend, I announced my intended retirement for July 1, 2026. The archdiocese has the policy of retiring pastors when they reach eighty. Last October I did reach that age but was able to talk Archbishop Vigneron into allowing me one more year with you. Next July first I will have served you for twenty years, a relationship that has been very dear to me. I feel that I have been most fortunate in being able to serve so long considering that I will be approaching eighty-one next summer. Even archbishops are required to resign their administrative duties at age seventy-five! Retirement does not mean not serving as a priest. Though I will not reside here at St. Kateri, I look forward to living with several other Archdiocesan Senior Priests in Livonia. Looking forward to serving 54 years of priestly ordination on February 4th this year I intend to continue functioning as a priest and helping out where needed. I don't intend to become "shepherd on a shelf"!

I share this news with you and the Dearborn community with gratitude for my time with you and a request for your continual prayerful support. Please note that when speaking with Bishop Monforton he made the point of wanting you to know that St. Kateri WILL NOT close and WILL have a pastor. I will certainly support your new pastor when he is named. I am sure with your proven spirit of generosity you will do the same.

Fr. Terry Kerner started the tradition back in the 1980s when he was at St. John Parish in Monroe and has continued it at St. Kateri, decorating the parish gathering space.

The stuffed bears are in various scenarios, from sitting at a table and playing cards or dressed up as firefighters and rescuing a fellow bear in a tree.

"It's all a collection from many, many years of people giving me these Santa bears and me not knowing what to do with them," Fr. Kerner told Detroit Catholic. "This dates back to 1986, and people at the parish were looking to downsize, and they had all these stuffed bears dressed as Santa."



VIRTUES, EXPLAINED! CONNECT WITH TRADITION AND GROW YOUR FAITH Love, Explained!



If you've ever been a guest at a Christian wedding, chances are you have heard 1 Corinthians 13:4-8: "Love is patient, love is kind ... love never fails."

But what and who we love is just as important as how we love. Loving God, we know, is the greatest commandment of Jesus Christ, followed by loving others (Matthew 22:37-40). We are called to exhibit this love even – and, perhaps, especially – when it is difficult, when it demands we sacrifice our own preferences, our own desires and our own prejudices (Matthew 5:46).

In doing this, we "no longer stand before God as a slave, in servile fear, or as a mercenary looking for wages, but as a son responding to the love of him who 'first loved us.'" (CCC 1828)

So yes, love is patient, and love is kind – and, when practiced correctly, love is also freedom.



GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

When I was 22, I went on a pilgrimage to Rome for the Jubilee Year of 2000. I was traveling light with just a backpack, one blue shirt and black pants, little money, and no Italian. I had a few close friends and one goal:

to reach the Eternal City. Despite the challenges and deprivations, I felt alive in a way I had never known before.

When do you feel most alive? I'd wager it's not when you're most comfortable or surrounded by stuff. Rather, it's when your life is aimed at something great; when you're on a meaningful and challenging journey with good friends.

That's the image the Magi give us in today's Gospel. They set out from the East not with certainty, but with hope. They study the signs, discipline their attention, and journey together, offering the best they have when they find the newborn King.

The Church gives us their story at the start of the year to reawaken something in us. We are not meant to drift. We're meant to journey as pilgrims. The Jubilee Year of 2025 may have ended, but our pilgrimage has not. Like the magi, the closer we get to Christ, the more alive we become.

The journey of the Magi reflects how treacherous our Christian life on earth can be. Always, evil works against us — Satan lays traps. He sows confusion. May we, like the Magi, recognize the will of God as our guiding star.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

The Three Wise Men

Magi, Three Kings, Three Wise Men...who were they?

We sing songs, give gifts, and move three mysterious men into our manger scenes. There's a rich heritage in the Catholic Church of celebrating the magi, but their origins are steeped in mystery. The original Greek calls these men magoi. The word is translated elsewhere in Scripture to mean "magician," but a similar word was used in ancient history to describe an entirely different set of people altogether. In what is now modern-day Iran, the ruling empire had a wealthy priestly caste known as the Magi. At the time of Christ, the Magi formed one of the ruling councils of the Parthian Empire. These priests interpreted dreams and read the stars to anticipate major events that could affect the fortunes of the empire.

We're not exactly sure where the magi of the Gospels traveled from. Matthew simply says "the east." History tells us that the ancient regions of Persia, Assyria, and Babylon all had a magi priesthood at the time of Christ. Whichever region they hailed from, they likely traveled over one thousand miles over the course of several months to arrive at the Holy Family. Unfortunately for the classic song, there is no concrete evidence these men were themselves kings, though they did bear gifts "from afar" at the prompting of their astronomical calculations.
